

## How do I find a School-Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship?



There are many advantages to starting a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship (SAT) and you may be interested in setting one up.

The biggest obstacle in setting up a SAT is finding an employer who is willing to take you on.

## Here's some tips on how you can find one.

- 1. If you are currently working part time, you could ask your employer to sign you up to a SAT.
- 2. A Group Training Organisation (GTO) employs apprentices and trainees and hires them out to "host employers".

- 3. Networking do you know anyone in this field? Family, friends? A lot of students find SAT's through this avenue.
- 4. Check your school email address frequently and listen to the notices. When we hear of positions we will advertise through these platforms.

## What can you do in the meantime? Make yourself as 'employable' as possible!

- Get enrolled in a pre-vocational course. You can start these through TAFE from semester 2 in year 10.

- 2. Make sure your effort and behaviour grades are looking good employers will look at these.
- 3. For apprenticeships, make sure your Maths and English are at least a pass.
- 4. Check your attendance if it is poor you may not get approval for a SAT.
- 5. Have a well written and professional looking resume and cover letter ready to go.
- 6. Complete, or be in the process of completing your Certificate II in Skills for Work and Vocational Placement.
